The baccalaureate (BS) program in Sociology prepares graduates to address societal concerns related to juvenile delinquency, education, teenage pregnancy, poverty and divorce. This program also equips graduates with critical thinking skills and the understanding of culture and social structures needed to work in the modern world characterized by diversity and societal change. A minor is also offered in this area.

**Course &
Curriculum
Information**

- A current Curriculum Worksheet, listing all courses required for the program may be found at <http://a-s.clayton.edu/sociology> under “Curriculum Worksheet”.
- Students will complete Areas A—E of the general core curriculum with no specific course requirements. Introduction to Statistics (MATH 1231) is recommended for Area D2.
- A lower division or other Statistics course in any discipline **MUST** be taken prior to the required Social Statistics (SOCI 3510).
- Major Specific Electives (Area F) requires completion of Introduction to Sociology (SOCI 110), Introduction to Marriage and Family (SOCI 2293), Contemporary Social Problems (SOCI 2420). Students must complete 3 additional lower division (1000-2000) electives with the following prefixes: AFAM, CPTG 2201, CSCI, FREN, HIST, MATH 1231, PHIL, POLS, PSYC, SOCI, SPAN, SOSC, or WST.
- Students are required to take 4 required upper division Sociology core classes: Sociological Theory (SOCI 3010), Social Statistics (SOCI 3510), Research Methods (SOCI 4501 and Sociology Practicum SOCI 4901—offered in the spring ONLY).
- Students will complete the remaining 16 courses from: Sociology electives, an approved minor and/or major related courses. Students may also elect to complete Intermediate or higher level Spanish or approved international language courses.
- Core sociology courses are combined with applied courses in human services and field work to meet certification requirements for working with non-profit service agencies and prepare them for careers in both the public and private sectors.
