




UNDERGRADUATE CONTINUING RESPONSE

- MBA is now at 267




GRADUATE RESPONSE

- Significant coordination between School of Graduate Studies and Graduate Enrollment Services




Forecasted Growth in Students Who Will Attend a Regional Four-Year Institution, 2012 to 2029
