



The UGA Small Business Development Center at Clayton State University is working with the Small Business Administration (SBA) to inform small businesses on the types of federally-approved loans available to cover operations costs.

Clayton State University accounting students participated in the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program hosted by the College of Business in February. Clayton State is

the only college or university in the state that has offered this service consistently for 30 years. VITA is a program through the Internal Revenue Service that offers free tax assistance to eligible individuals.

allowing small businesses affected by COVID-19 to get an advance of \$10,000 within three days of applying for the loan to cover paid sick leave, payroll and other operations costs. The advance does not have to be repaid. The EIDL program offers up to \$2 million in capital to


Taxpayers must earn an income of \$55,000 or less to be eligible to participate in the program. Individuals can receive assistance with forms 1040EZ, 1040A, and simple 1040s. "The main advantage to the public is that if they are eligible, they save a significant amount of money by not having to pay to have their taxes done," said Dr. Andrew Sbaraglia, assistant professor of accounting. "The other advantage is that through e-filing, the client can get their Sbaraglia refunds quickly and may not need to get a refund anticipation loan from a commercial firm. Besides saving the fee, they also save on the loan interest."







Candidates with business or nonbusiness bachelor's degrees may apply for admission. The Master of Science in Supply Chain Analytics (MSSCA) program will be unique in the state of Georgia and the southeast. Online classes will be offered in eight-week terms.
