CAROL MAIER, MARTHA RAWDIN, AND KAY BROWN went to Atlanta recently to attend an IBM seminar.







Clayton Junior College is to have a new classroom building.

The one million dollar construction project was authorized Wednesday by the Board of Regents in their monthly meeting on the recommendation of Chancellor George L. Simpson, Jr.

Design of the building, which will be devoted to instructional space for art and music, general classroom space and faculty offices, was awarded to Bothwell, Jenkins, Slay and Associates, Architects, of Decatur. The same firm designed the current buildings of the college.

According to President Downs, the additional classroom building was requested because of the rapid growth of the college--enrollment last fall was up 90 percent over enrollment in the fall quarter of 1969, making Clayton the fastest growing institution in the University System.

In accordance with the Board of Regents' policy in developing community colleges, the original facilities of the college were financed through a bond issue passed by the citizens of Clayton County. Funds for the new classroom facility and further expansion will be provided by the Board of Regents.
