BOARD OF REGENTS ACTIONS ANNOUNCED

At its September 10 meeting, the Board of Regents approved the following:

- 1) An associate in Arts and Associate in Science degrees with twoyear programs of study leading to baccalaureate degrees in the arts, humanities, sciences, mathematics, social sciences, teacher education, business administration, and pre-professional areas; and two-year career programs in nursing and secretarial studies at Clayton Junior College, effective Fall Quarter, 1969;
- 2) Authorized the appointment of Stanley Seburn Jones as Dean of Students at Clayton Junior College, effective August 25, 1969;
- 3) Authorized the appointment of Mrs. Irene A. Sprague as Instructor and Head of the Department of Nursing at Clayton Junior College, effective August 12, 1969;
- 4) Authorized Clayton Junior College to install a student service fee effective Fall Quarter, 1969.

BOARD OF REGENTS APPROVES LIBRARIAN FOR COLLEGE

At its October 8 meeting in Atlanta, the Board of Regents authorized the appointment of <u>Dr. Margaret E. Newhard</u> as Librarian with the rank of Assistant Professor at Clayton Junior College, effective September 15, 1969.

Before joining the Clayton Junior College faculty, Dr. Newhard was a librarian and Spanish instructor at the University of North Carolina. Dr. Newhard was graduated from Shorter College, Rome, Ga., with a Bachelor of Arts degree in French. She received the Master of Arts degree in French and the Doctor of Philosophy degree in Spanish from the University of North Carolina. In 1969, Dr. Newhard received the Master of Library Science degree from the University of North Carolina.

In 1958, Dr. Newhard was awarded a fellowship to teach English at the Colombo Americano at Bogota, Colombia. In 1956, she received a fellowship from the South Fellowships Funds. She is a member of the Georgia Library Association, the American Library Association, and the South Atlantic Modern Language Association.

A Faculty Investment Club will be established on campus. John Ernst, Assistant Professor of Business Administration, wants to determine the amount of faculty interest for formation of the club.




WORKSHOP ON CARDIOPULMONARY RESUSCITATION SET HERE ON JAN. 7

ENROLLMENT INCREASES OVER FALL QUARTER

The count of students enrolled for winter quarter classes at Clayton Junior College stands at 966 as of today, according to Dr. Leonard Daniel, Dean of the College. Dr. Daniel explained the official enrollment is the count of students enrolled at the end of the schedule change period (January 12).

A few students are yet expected to enroll - some having completed all procedures except payment of fees. A few students may drop from school by the deadline. Dean Daniel pointed out that the current count represents a 2.5 percent increase over the fall quarter enrollment of 942.

\$10,000 GIFT MADE TO COLLEGE

A \$10,000 grant from the John Word West Educational Foundation has been made to Clayton Junior College for the purpose of providing student loans.

Dr. Harry S. Downs, college president, accepted the gift from Mr. Hugh Dickson, President of the Board of Directors of the foundation. The funds will be utilized for emergency loans, matching loan funds available through the National Defense Education Act, and in other ways to match loan funds made available or to provide direct student loans.

The foundation was established in 1958 by the late Colonel John Word West, a native Clayton Countian. Colonel West served as President of North Georgia College and taught mathematics at Georgia Military Academy for 32 years.

DISTRIBUTION OF CLASS ROLLS IS TODAY

Initial class rolls are expected to be disbributed to faculty this afternoon, according to an announcement from <u>Dean Daniel</u>. With improved procedures this quarter, these rolls should represent the listing of students who picked up a class card for the given class, paid fees, and turned in these cards for processing.

STUDENTS WHO DID NOT COMPLETE THESE PROCEDURES ARE NOT ENROLLED.

<u>Dr. Daniel</u> requested faculty upon receipt of the rolls, to compare the listing with your class attendance and report any students not attending. Any students not on the roll should have received a Drop-Add Form (signed by <u>Dr. Daniel</u>, <u>Miss Brisendine</u>, or <u>Mrs. Hall</u>); otherwise they should not be attending class. If there is any question, have the student report to the Office of the Dean.

The Selective Service situation is extremely complicated, especially with recent changes which are not yet clear even to local boards. Dean Daniel has issued the following statement regarding the Selective Service situation:

"We are receiving complaints from some boards that persons on our campus are giving erroneous information to students. The one office that is responsible for certifying the status of students is the Office of Admissions and Records. This office is undoubtedly more knowledgeable of the situation than anyone else on campus. Except for rather routine matters, their basic advice to students is to check with their local draft board.

"All of us want to be helpful to students, but some of the advice that some students are quoting from 'someone' on our campus is likely to get them drafted instead of deferred."

DEADLINE FOR SCHEDULE CHANGES IS MONDAY EVENING

The deadline for schedule changes is 8:30 p.m. Monday, January 12.

Dean Daniel requests that if it is convenient, remind students of this deadline. However, with only a few exceptions, classes are at capacity, and only changes necessary to remove conflicts are possible. (Students may still officially drop a course past this date, but a W grade will be recorded, if dropped prior to February 6. Courses dropped prior to schedule change deadline do not appear on the final transcript.)

STUDENT TEACHERS TO VISIT CAMPUS FRIDAY

Thirty-two Clayton County student teachers have been invited to visit the college campus on Friday, Jan. 16. The visit and tour of the campus is part of an orientation program for the student teachers who represent many colleges in the state.

The student teachers will be greeted by <u>President Downs</u>, <u>Dean Daniel</u> and <u>Dean Jones</u>. They will be given a brief tour of the campus and, afterwards will have lunch in the cafeteria.



FINAL ENROLLMENT FOR WINTER QUARTER IS 962

The final count of students enrolled for winter quarter is 962. Fall quarter enrollment was 942. Of the total enrollment, 861 students are classified as freshmen. There are 89 sophomores enrolled, eight transient students and four students are listed in other categories. Male students account for 648 of the total student body.

New students accounted for 255 of the total enrollment. A breakdown on new students is: 93, beginning freshmen; 114, transfer freshmen; 33, transfer sophomores; 12, transients; and 3 in other categories. Fortyfive new students were accepted into the developmental program.

Clayton County, as in fall quarter, contributed the largest amount of students; followed closely by Fulton County. Spalding County provided the third largest group of students, followed by Henry and Fayette Counties.



BOOK AUTHORED BY DR. DOIG TO BE PUBLISHED

Dr. James C. Doig, Associate Professor of Philosophy and Acting Chairman of the Division of Humanities, has been notified by a publishing firm in Holland that a book he has written will be published by the firm this year.

The book is entitled "Aquinas on Metaphysics. A historico-doctrinal study of the Commentary on the Metaphysics." The publishing firm will produce 1,250 copies of the book which will be 424 pages in length.

According to Dr. Doig, the book was written when he was studying for his Doctor of Philosophy degree at the University of Louvain, Belgium. He stated that this will be the first published study of medieval philosophy.

BLOOD DRIVE SET FOR MAY 26





DINNER TO HONOR GRADUATES


