NURSING STUDENT LOANS AND SCHOLARSHIPS

President Harry S. Downs has been notified by the Director of the Division of Health Manpower Educational Services, Bureau of Health Professions Education and Manpower Training, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, that the college has received \$12,809 for the 1970-71 fiscal year under the Health Professions Student Assistant Programs.

LIBRARY GRANT

An amended grant award notification has been received from the Director of the Division of Library Programs, Bureau of Libraries and Education Technology, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, bringing the total amount of funds available to Clayton Junior College for the acquisition of higher education library materials to \$6,521 for fiscal year 1971.

GUBERNATORIAL RALLY

The Student Activities Committee has sent invitations to all gubernatorial candidates for a rally to be held Tuesday, July 28, in the cafeteria of the Student Center. The rally is to enable students unfamiliar with platforms of candidates or who will vote for the first time to make knowledgeable decisions in casting their ballots.

There will be two sessions, 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Each gubernatorial candidate will be given ten minutes to present his platform and after each session, students will be invited to talk with the candidate and ask any questions they might have.

FINANCIAL AID

Mrs. Lucy Champion, Financial Aid Officer, announced today that 120 Clayton Junior College students received approximately \$50,000 in financial aid for the 1969-70 school year making it possible for them to get their education.

These students received money from the College Work Study Programs, Loans, Grants and Scholarships.

The 61 students that were awarded College Work Study worked

approximately 16,000 hours receiving valuable training.

Mrs. Champion further stated that August 24 - 28 would be declared "Honor College Work Study Students Week".


Mr. Bolander is married, interested in politics, is a sports enthusiast, and has a mongrel-German Shepherd dog, "Schiffa".

FINANCIAL AID FIGURES RELEASED.....

Latest figures show that \$63,893 in financial aid was awarded to Clayton Junior College students during the 1969-70 fiscal year.

Mrs. Lucy Champion, Financial Aid Officer, said that anticipated appropriations for 1970-71 total \$78,807.

A breakdown of the appropriations shows \$38,600 for College Work Study; \$11,100 - Educational Opportunity Grant; \$11,685 (proposed) - National Defense Student Loan; \$2,213 - Law Enforcement Educational Program; \$2,400 - Regent Scholarship; \$5,358 - Nursing Student Scholarship, and \$7,451 - Nursing Student Loan.
