

## "Women's Art: Women's Vision" Women's History Month at Clayton State

"Women's Art: Women's Vision." That's the theme for a series of event events celebrating Women's History Month at Clayton State University.

"In this series of events we celebrate women as artists and visionaries who inspire us and move us forward," explains Dr. Deborah Deckner, assistant professor of Psychology and chair of the Clayton State 2008 Women's History Month Committee.

In this case, a "month" runs from a musical kick-off celebration on Monday, Mar. 10 through to a discussion on pregnancy in the workplace on Tuesday, Apr. 8. All Women's History Month Events at Clayton State are free (with the exception of the Women's Forum Luncheon) and all are open to the public.

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The Mar. 10 musical kickoff will run from 12:30 p.m. to 1:30 p.m. and will feature Clayton State music faculty members Dr. Michiko Otaki and Dr. Kurt-Alexander Zeller, plus additional Clayton State University faculty and students. The Musical Kick-off Celebration will be held in the Choral Room of Spivey Hall.

On Wednesday, Mar. 12, Clayton State's unofficial poet laureate, Dr. Brigitte Byrd, assistant professor in the Department of Language and Literature, will perform selected readings from her book, "The Dazzling Land" in room UC 272 of the James M. Baker Center from 12:30 p.m. to 1:30 p.m.

The next day, Thursday, Mar. 13, Women's History Month moves off-campus with Assistant Professor of Communicative Arts and Integrative Studies Dr. Wendy Burns-Ardolino's reading/discussion/book signing of her new book, "Jiggle: (Re)Shaping the American Woman" at the Morrow Barnes and Noble on Mt. Zion Road. Burns-Ardolino will be appearing at the Barnes and Noble from 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

On Monday, Mar. 17, Dr. Susan Copeland, assistant professor in the Clayton State Language and Literature will lecture on Georgia author Flannery O' Connor in room UC 272 of the Baker Center from 12:30 p.m. to 1:30 p.m.

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## **The Portal Goes Live**

On Monday, Mar. 10, the Clayton State University campus community will have a new web communications tool: the Luminis Portal.

According to Dr. John Bryan, vice president of the Office of Information Technology and Services (OITS) and the project sponsor for the portal implementation, Clayton State will be the first university in the University System of Georgia to implement the new Version 4 Luminis Portal from SunGard Higher Education. He anticipates that the SWAN (Secure Web Access Network) Portal will provide a world-class intranet vehicle offering many benefits to students, faculty and staff.

In conjunction with the new student email conversion, students will now be able to access Exchange email, Banner, and the DUCK via a single sign-on – using one Network ID and password. WebCT will use the same username, but it will not have single sign-on initially. Faculty and staff can also access email, Banner, and more through the Portal. This dynamic, customizable environment will deliver important campus material and will also enable each user to personalize his/her Portal site with the links and information most relevant and desired.

A new link to the SWAN Portal will be in place on the University Web site home page on Monday. Simply go to www.clayton.edu and click on the Portal link. You will arrive at the landing/log-in page. Use your network ID and login password to access the Portal, which displays informa-

## **Clayton State University Professor Awarded NIH Grant**

Dr. Fran Norflus, an assistant professor for the Department of Natural Sciences in the College of Arts & Sciences at Clayton State University, was awarded a portion of a grant from the National Institute of Health. This is a collaborative project that Clayton State University has with Emory University.

"The grant that I was awarded is entitled Localization and Function of Huntington Associated Protein 1 (HAP1) in C. elegans. I was notified that this grant would be funded in early February and will begin this summer," explains Norflus.

Norflus has worked in research areas of Huntington's disease preceding her work on this grant. Prior to her accepting a position at Clayton State University in 2005, she was a postdoctoral fellow at Emory University and Massachusetts General Hospital. At this time she was performing studies to develop treatments on transgenic mice that have Huntington's disease.

"When I came to Clayton State, I switched my research to studies that used the model organism Caenorhabditis elegans (C. elegans). This is an excellent model for research due to its small size, ease of manipulation, short lifespan and low cost," says Norflus.

For this grant, Norflus is collaborating with Dr. Claire-Anne Gutekunst and Dr. Guy Benian at Emory University.

"We will use a knockout strain of C. elegans that has the Huntington Associated Protein 1 (HAP1) knocked out. HAP1 is a protein that interacts with the Huntington protein but its specific function has not been fully determined. We will use these worms to try to elucidate more on its role," says Norflus.

At Clayton State, Norflus will characterize the behavior or the knockout strain to determine if it is deficient compared to wild type worms. An undergraduate student, Kathy Szeniawski (McDonough), will work on this project as a part of requirements for her biology research course.

Szeniawski will perform some preliminary genetic studies with the worms. She will then start the behavioral studies. Szeniawski plans to continue with this project throughout the summer.

"I am anxious to start the studies on the HAP1 knockout and hope in the future to present the findings at a research meeting," adds Norflus. ■

## **Clayton State University's First ROTC Scholarship Awarded**

Clayton State University recently welcomed Col. Chuck Waggoner, ROTC Eastern commander, and the new Clayton State University cadre, with a reception that also recognized the awarding of the University's first ROTC scholarship.

The reception, hosted by Clayton State Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs Dr. Sharon Hoffman, welcomed the new Clayton State University cadre; Maj. Peter W. Almedia, Sgt. 1st Class Curtis Ricks, human resource technician Sylvia Simmons, and a Gold Bar recruiter. Waggoner, along with Lt. Col. Kevin Anderson, professor of Military Science at Georgia State University, presented the first ROTC scholarship awarded at Clayton State University to Oriskany Carr (Douglasville).

"I am very excited to come to Clayton State and I am very thankful for the scholarship I have received," said Carr.

Carr is a senior at Chapel Hill High School and will begin the pre-nursing program at Clayton State fall 2008. Her father is a retired master sergeant.

The Clayton State University ROTC program will begin with the fall 2008 semester and will be initially introduced as a military science (MS) program for freshman and sophomores. The ROTC program will begin as a full partnership program with Georgia State University.

"The goal is to quickly do well and earn an invitation to expand the program to include MS programs for juniors and seniors," says Dr. Mannie E. Hall., Clayton State director of Academic Outreach. "Finally, it is important to reinforce that Interim Dean of the School of Arts & Sciences Dr. John Campbell skillfully formulated the MS curriculum pieces up to this point, which is much appreciated."

The value of the new Clayton State University MS program is the availability of the robust ROTC scholarships for Clayton State students who want to become future Army officers. ■

## Women's History Month Musical Kickoff Features Some of Clayton State's Finest Talents

"Women's Art: Women's Vision," Women's History Month at Clayton State University, will start off with a performance by some of the University's finest musical talents.

The Monday, Mar. 10 Musical Kickoff Celebration for Women's History Month will run from 12:30 p.m. to 1:30 p.m. in the Choral Rehearsal Hall (room 157) of the University's Music Education Building, and will feature Clayton State music faculty members Dr. Michiko Otaki (director of Keyboard Studies), Dr. Kurt-Alexander Zeller (director of Opera and Vocal Studies), Dr. Gina Harvey (assistant professor of Voice) and Staff Accompanist Alex Benford. Clayton State students performing will include Stephen Odom, Nicole Wilder, Leah Davis and Laverne Huggins.

Otaki and Zeller will perform four songs by Rebecca Clarke (1886-1979), one of the most fascinating figures in British music in the first half of the 20th century, according to Zeller. One of the first women to study at the Royal College of Music, she trained both as a composer and as a violist. Despite the violent objection of her father, she became one of the first women to play professionally in formerly all-male orchestras.

Although she was not a prolific writer of songs, Clarke was one of the most impor-

tant writers of English-language art song in the decade of the 1920s, and her songs are marked by a sense of drama and character that no British composer before Benjamin Britten in the next generation can equal," notes Zeller. "The four songs we will perform demonstrate the power and range of her song writing."

Harvey will also be singing and Benford will be serving as accompanist for many of the performers. The entire Musical Kickoff Celebration is free and open to the public. ■

Clayton State University Assistant Professor & Coordinator of Integrative Studies & Women's Studies Dr. Wendy A. Burns-Ardolino will be at the Barnes & Noble on Mt. Zion from 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, Mar. 13 for what can only be called an event. Burns-Ardolino will be giving a reading of her new book, "Jiggle: (Re)Shaping American Women," followed by a discussion and a book signing.

While readings/discussions/book signings are not uncommon for authors and/or bookstores, the Mar. 13 event at Barnes & Noble will be an uncommon event, since Burns-Ardolino has written a most uncommon book, looking at the reshaping of American women... or, at least, the cultural significance of the relationship between American women and their bodies as mediated by both traditional and contemporary foundation garments.

"Jiggle" has just been released by Lexington Books (www.lexingtonbooks.com). Beginning in the 1930s with a discussion of traditional foundation garments, Burns-Ardolino analyzes contemporary shapewear in terms of shaping women physically, culturally and socially.

"This book is for everyone," she explains. "But, particularly for people interested in cultural studies, sociology, media studies and women's studies. The popular audience would most likely be women who wonder about how other women experience their bodies and how the media influences how women see and experience their bodies."

Focusing on the corporate, cultural and individual practices and meanings of women's experiences with foundation garments, Burns-Ardolino says her goal in writing "Jiggle" is to raise awareness and consciousness about how women experience their bodies, and to continue a discussion about how women's social agency is linked to femininity and female embodied experience.

Mar. 13 should be an interesting evening at Barnes & Noble. ■

## Life's Transitions...

Former Vice President Of Academic Affairs, Dr. Jack Carlton, 85

Dr. Jack K. Carlton, Clayton State's first vice president of Academic Affairs, passed away at the age of 85 on Tuesday, Feb. 26.

In addition to serving as Clayton State's VPAA from 1986 to 1990, Dr. Carlton was also the founding president of Macon Junior College (now Macon State College), serving in that role from July 1967 to July 1972. His appointment as Clayton State's vice president of Academic Affairs came at the time when Clayton State was making the transition from a junior college to a four-year college.

A chemist by training, Dr. Carlton spent his entire professional career in higher education. In addition to his leadership roles at Clayton State and Macon State, he also served as dean of the College of Arts & Sciences at Louisiana State University in New Orleans, dean of the College of Arts & Sciences at the University of West Florida, chancellor of Western Carolina University, vice president of Academic Affairs at Middle Tennessee State University and chairman of the department of Mathematics and Science at Gordon College. He was also a faculty member at the University of Arkansas and Georgia Tech.

Born in Baileyville, Tx., Dr. Carlton earned his B.S. degree in Chemistry from Centenary College and his M.S. and Ph.D. degrees, also in Chemistry, from Louisiana State University.

A memorial service for Dr. Carlton was held on Friday, Feb 29 at the First Presbyterian Church in Milledgeville, Ga.

This is the second round of quilts sent through the QOVF by the TQG which hopes to send more. Brackett's personal goal is to send at least two more quilts.

"Each quilt comes labeled with the name and city of the quilter and place for the recipient's name. It also includes a hand written note from the quilter and it is all

tion based on roles. Three roles are in place for the initial implementation: student, faculty and employee.

The University Tab, the HUB Tab, and the Library Tab are seen by all users. Other tabs are viewed only by students, faculty, or employees – depending upon what your role may be. Some users will have multiple roles. There is also a "My Tab" page which users may customize and tailor based on their preferences.

During the previous two weeks, Beta test groups have been viewing the Portal and giving feedback. The project team has also met with key departmental personnel to obtain comments and further refine the information which is presented in the Portal. As increasing numbers of people access the Portal and begin using it as a primary source for information, the next phase of the project will commence. Over the second half of spring semester, the

Project Team will conduct training with specific individuals to begin the gradual transition of Portal content development to various departmental areas.

In addition, OITS staff members will be working with designated department groups to evaluate the ongoing development of the Portal and to enhance their capability to utilize the Portal's many additional features, such as Course Studio and Group Studio. Training and content development will continue over the summer.

Also serving on the project team is Tom Marshall, director of Administrative According to Dr. Rodger Bates, dean of the Clayton State College of Professional Studies, this fellowship allows Duley to give clinical education presentations related to oral health and disease at professional meetings, in dental hygiene schools and before community groups. Corporate Member GlaxoSmithKline provides American Dental Education Association (ADEA) fellowship recipients a stipend of \$13,000 to be used for travel and education.

One of just three recipients of the 2008 award, Duley, as 2008 ADEA/GCK Fellow, will also be promoting the profession of dental hygiene. A member of the Clayton State University faculty since 2003, Duley previously received the ADEA/Colgate-Palmolive Allied Dental Educators Fellowship, joining the fellows of the 2007-2008 American Dental Education Association (ADEA) Leadership Institute.

## Sloan Selected All-Peach Belt Conference for Men's Basketball

Clayton State's Michael Sloan was selected to the All-Peach Belt Conference Men's Basketball squad for the 2007/2008 season.

It's the first ever All-Peach Belt Conference selection for Sloan, a senior guard from Jonesboro, Ga. He becomes the eighth different Laker to earned All-Peach Belt Conference honors since Clayton State officially joined the Peach Belt in 1997.

Sloan has stepped to the forefront this season for the Lakers and head coach Gordon Gibbons. The 6-foot-4, 185-pounder leads Clayton State in scoring, averaging 13 points a game. Sloan scored in double-figures in 21 of the Lakers' first 27 games, and scored 20 or more points on three occasions. He scored a career-high 28 points against UNC-Pembroke, along with 23 points in the season opener against Tennessee Temple and 20 points against North Georgia.

Sloan eclipsed four Clayton State career records this season. He set the Laker career marks for 3-point field goals and 3point field goal attempts, while setting the Clayton State career mark for steals with 170. Sloan has also played in 117 career games at Clayton State, a new Laker alltime record.

In addition, this season Sloan also became the sixth player in Clayton State history to break the 1,000-point mark for his career. He's currently fifth all-time in scoring for the Lakers. ■


## Ninth-Ranked Clayton State Knocks Off Eighth-Ranked Nova Southeastern, 6-3

The nationally-ranked Clayton State Laker women's tennis team faced its first big road test of the 2008 season with a showdown on Mar. 3 at eighth-ranked Nova Southeastern. The Lakers passed the test with a 6-3 victory. The win kept ninth-ranked Clayton State undefeated at 8-0 on the season.

The key for the Lakers was in doubles, where Clayton State swept the three matches. Clayton State head coach Tamas Szabados made a key strategic move by splitting the No. 1 team of Anna Redecsi and Julia Chergova.

Chergova teamed with Kristina Jonutyte at No. 1 as they stunned the nation's ninthranked doubles team, Ulia Talakenko and Alexa Korotkevich from Nova Southeastern 8-6. Redecsi, meanwhile, was paired with Selma Hidass at No. 2 and they posted an 8-3 victory over Nova Southeastern's Tsippy Waterman and Edita Kulichova. At No. 3, the Laker team of Elena Bondari and Viktoriya Semyrodenk won 8-4 over Andee Johnson and Elena Vahl.

In singles, the Lakers won three matches. Chergova knocked Korotkevich 6-4, 6-1 at No. 2, while Clayton State's Katie White won a 6-1, 6-1 decision over Johnson 6-1, 6-1 and Bondari prevailed at No. 6 with a 6-1, 6-2 over Miranda Falzone. ■

## Number 22 Clayton State Wins Southbridge Pirate Invitational by Three Strokes

Following up a tremendous first round, the 22nd-ranked Clayton State Lakers carried over that momentum into the final round and won the Southbridge Pirate Invitational on Feb. 26 at the Southbridge Golf Club.

The Lakers followed up Monday's oneover 289 with a four-over 292 in Tuesday's second and final round to capture the title in the 11-team field with a five-over 581.

Individually, Clayton State's Will Lewis followed up Monday's four-under 68 with a three-under 69 on Tuesday to win the individual title with a 7-under 137. Wilcox finished two strokes ahead of Queens' Iain Hall, last season's NCAA Division II South Atlantic Regional champion, and five strokes ahead of Clayton State teammate Jonathan Visconti (68-74 = 142) and Lander's Cooper Tinsley (71-71 = 142).

As a team, Clayton State finished three strokes ahead of 13th-ranked Georgia, which made a late rally with a second round score of two-under 286, followed by Coker at 590, 24th-ranked Lander at 591 and Newberry with a 594.

The five-over 581 is the second-lowest score ever for a Clayton State team in a 36-hole tournament. It's the second tournament championship for the Lakers this season combined fall and spring, and the third tournament championship since Barry Harwell took over as Laker head coach last season.

Wilcox's 7-under 137 is a new record for the lowest score to par in a 36-hole tournament in the history of Clayton State men's golf. It's also his third individual championship in his career – the most ever by a Laker golfer.

In addition to Wilcox and Visconti, Wade Binfield finished tied for 16th for Clayton State with a five-over 149 (74-75), while Neil McBride finished tied for 28th with a nine-over 153 (79-74). Rounding out the Laker scoring was freshman Kevin Duncan finishing tied for 48th with a 158 (80-78). ■

## Ragin Selected All-Peach Belt Conference for Women's Basketball

Clayton State's Shantel Ragin has been selected to the All-Peach Belt Conference Women's Basketball squad.

It's the second straight season that Ragin, a senior forward from Pembroke Pines, Fla., has been selected All-Peach Belt. She joins former Clayton State greats Sharon Wiles (2006, 2007), Jasmine Patterson (2005, 2006) and Catreria Shaw (2002, 2003) as two-time All-Conference selections at Clayton State.

Throughout the season, Ragin had 19 games in which she reached double-figures in scoring, including four doubledoubles. She scored a career-high 28 points in her last regular season home game against Lander on Feb. 23, plus 24 points against USC-Aiken, 22 points each against Lenoir-Rhyne and Georgia Southwestern and 20 points against North Georgia. Down the final stretch of the regular season is when Ragin has played her best basketball. In the last eight games of the season, Ragin averaged 19 points and seven rebounds a game with three straight games of scoring 20 or more points. For the season, Ragin ranked fourth in the Peach Belt Conference in steals, fifth in assists, eighth in blocked shots, ninth in rebounding and 10th in field goal percentage.

For her career, Ragin is ranked fifth alltime at Clayton State in steals and seventh all-time in assists. ■

## Lakers Defeat USC Aiken in Triple Overtime to Advance to NCAA Tournament

Drama. In college basketball, when you think of overtime games, you think of drama. When you think of games against nationally-ranked teams, you think of drama. When you think of conference tournaments, you think of drama. When you think of "win-or-go-home" games, you think of drama.

Thus it was yesterday afternoon and evening, when Coach Gordon Gibbons' Lakers faced all four dramatic scenarios in the finals of the Peach Belt Conference Tournament. After having already disposed of second-seeded (and nationallyranked) Augusta State and third-seeded (20 game-winner) Georgia College in the previous two rounds of the tournament, the Lakers took on tournament top seed, 27-2 USC-Aiken on the Pacers' home court for the league championship. After a 13-14 regular season (including a 1-5 mark against Augusta, Georgia and Aiken), and even with three tournament wins, the Lakers were still in a must-win situation as far as advancing to the NCAA Division II tournament for the second straight year. It took an exhausting three overtimes and almost three hours, but Clayton State eventually won the most dramatic basketball game in Laker history, 89-87.

In the course of an average season, a college team might play three overtime games. Double overtime comes up maybe once every three years or so. Triple overtime? You go look for the record books. In Clayton State's entire basketball history, there'd been one, a 119-116 win at Columbus State in 1999. Until Sunday night. After losing a 14 point lead with seven-and-a-half minutes left in regulation (the Lakers actually had the lead for the bulk of the game), Clayton State ended the first 40 minutes tied at 71. The three overtimes turned out to be an endurance test, made even more so by Gibbons' full court, full game man-toman pressure, with neither team gaining more than a four point advantage.

Tied at 80, the Pacers had the last shot in the first overtime. Brian Kelly blocked it. Tied at 84, the Lakers had the last shot in double overtime. Backup point guard Trey Goss (starter and tournament MVP Tracy Williams had fouled out in regulation) missed a three. Finally, with the game tied at 87 in triple overtime, Laker All-Peach Belt senior forward Michael Sloan took a pass from Goss and hit a jumper from the foul line with three seconds left. Two subsequent turnovers gave the Pacers the ball back with 2.7 seconds remaining, but a desperation three was short at the buzzer.

Assuming everyone survived, the Lakers will find out about their next dramatic performance in the NCAA tournament later this week. ■
