## Facilities Management to Focus on Improved Customer Service

Perhaps you've been living in Swan Lake for the past year. Or you've been so busy deleting spam from your computer that you haven't had a chance to leave your desk. If that's the case, then maybe you haven't noticed the construction taking place on campus... the most significant extended facility expansion in the University's 39 year history.

One place that you can rest assured has noticed these landmark changes in Clayton State is over at Facilities Management... the Office Formerly Known as Plant Operations. Everyone recognizes that the addition of student housing on campus, as well as the Student Activities Center and the new home for the School of Business, add up to a signif-

icant change in the culture of Clayton State University... leading to corresponding changes in Student Affairs, Campus Life, Public Safety, Recreation and Wellness, and the School of Business, to name just a few areas impacted by the new facilities.

Another department that will be very heavily effected by the facility expansion is one that possibly not everyone has thought of — Facilities Management. However, stop and think for a moment. Previously, Plant Operations was organized and staffed to operate and maintain a campus of roughly 580,000 square feet. Now (or at least, come this fall) add in an additional 250,000 square feet, and you're increasing the campus by approximately

43 percent... that's no small change, and no small additional area to maintain. In fact, the new additions to campus, along with the still-recent addition of the Baker Center, mean that Clayton State is now below the University System of Georgia average in facilities management cost per square foot. In part as a result of these upcoming changes, Plant Operations is now Facilities Management, reflecting some significant changes of their own.

"These changes reflect the broader activities, scope and mission of the department," says Director of Facilities Management (formerly Director of Plant Operations) Harun Biswas.



Director of Recreation & Wellness Cindy Lauer, in the midst of preparing to move to the SAC, took some time out from packing up her Cybex machines to answer some FAQs about the fitness center and the SAC.



A. With the caveat that we reserve the right to adjust the hours slightly to meet the budget, the proposed hours are: Monday through Friday, 6 a.m. to 11 p.m.; Saturday, 10 a.m. to 8 p.m.; Sunday, 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. The SAC will be closed on all major holidays and when it may be necessary to resurface the gym floors.

Q. Who will be using the SAC?

A. Clayton State Students, faculty, staff, retirees and alumni. Current SmartBodies' community members were also offered the invitation to join, however, due to the membership price increase,



only a select group have committed to joining the new facility.

Q. Will the fitness center be open to the public?

A. No new memberships will be offered to the public.

Q. What facilities will the SAC have?

A. Ballroom, game room, café, student organization offices and work space, fitness center, two basketball courts, two group exercise studios, and administrative offices

Q. What type of equipment will the fitness center have?

A. Ninety percent of the cardio equipment

will be Cybex and we will also have a new line of Cybex weight machines and free weights. There will be more than 40 pieces of cardio on the balcony including treadmills, Arc Trainers, elliptical machines, bikes, rowers, and stair climbers.

Q. Will the fitness center in the SAC take the place of SmartBodies?

A. Actually, the new facility will take the place of both SmartBodies and the student weight room. Both entities are being dissolved as of Aug. 1, 2008. The "SmartBodies" name might be recycled

## School of Nursing Wraps up "Boot Camp" for High School Students

The School of Nursing at Clayton State University recently wrapped up a successful week long Summer Boot Camp for high school students.

"The primary goal is to recruit outstanding students into college and ultimately the nursing program. Whether they choose Clayton State or another university, it is essential that the nursing workforce be provided with outstanding nursing graduates who are capable of caring for diverse patient populations," says Dr. Susan Sanner, associate professor of Nursing and Nursing Workforce Diversity project director.

Preparations and planning for the program began in January 2008. The event is made possible through a federal Nursing Workforce Diversity Grant. Each student attending the program received a \$250 stipend.

"A total of 15 high school students representing three different high schools attended. Several students are rising seniors in their high schools, while several graduated in May 2008. Students came from Stockbridge High School in Henry County, Mundy's Mill High School in Clayton County, and Fayette High School in Fayette County. Because of an addi-

tional opening, we were also able to accept one student from Forest Park High School," Sanner explains.

The camp began with orientation for the students and parents, which included a tour of the campus by Clayton State's Office of Admissions. During the week students were able to spend time in the state of the art simulation lab learning lab skills.

Sanner spoke with the students on career and practice options for the nursing profession. The Clayton State Center for Academic Success (CAS) also made a presentation to the students. CAS

The Office of Facilities Management is still under the direction of Vice President for Business and Operations Dr. David Heflin, but more has changed than just the name. Biswas will still direct the function of plant operations, under which are included Maintenance, Grounds and Building Services. Reporting to Biswas will be assistant directors Darren Thomas (Maintenance), Alan Beasley (Grounds) and Donald West (Building Services). West's responsibilities will also cover custodial functions, as well as building and event set-up.

"I welcome the new facilities, the added responsibility, and the challenges that come with maintaining new facilities," he says. "We look forward to continuing to provide good quality service throughout the campus."

One of the areas that Facilities Management's customers (i.e., Clayton

State's faculty, staff, students and visitors) will be noticing a change is in daytime services. Biswas plans to increase service levels during the day by means of adding a Building Services Coordinator, a position that will also help provide for better weekend services... part of Facilities Management's plan to deal with the transition to a residential campus.

Also under the Office of Facilities Management is Facilities Planning and Design Services, a function currently performed by Heflin and Biswas. However, as the campus continues to grow, the future plan is for a separate director to be hired to run this function, which includes responsibility for the campus master plan, strategic property acquisition and off-campus instructional sites.

Further changes are also in the works in the technology process of Facilities Management, notably in the now-antiquated work order management system, which will be moving towards a completely on-line system wherein customers can track work orders and work orders will flow seamlessly.

"Due to the increase in square footage on campus, we are making these changes in organization, staffing and technology," notes Biswas. "Plant Ops needed to change in light of what has happened on campus in the last two years.

"It's all about better customer service."

## Economic Impact of University System Reaches \$11 Billion

An updated report offers confirmation that Georgia's public university system continues to be one of the state's key economic engines. Together, the 35 institutions of the University System of Georgia (USG) packed an economic impact totaling \$11 billion on the state's economy during Fiscal Year 2007.

The Intellectual Capital Partnership Program (ICAPP), an initiative of the Board of Regents' Office of Economic Development, commissioned the Selig Center for Economic Growth in the University of Georgia's Terry College of Business to analyze data collected between July 1, 2006, and June 30, 2007, to calculate the University System's FY2007 economic impact. This work updates a similar study conducted on FY2004 data that placed the University System's economic impact at \$9.7 billion. The first such study cal-

culated the USG's impact at \$7.7 billion in FY1999.

In addition to the \$11 billion in total impact generated by the University System in FY2007, the study determined that Georgia's public higher education system is responsible for 106,267 full- and part-time jobs – 2.6 percent of all the jobs in the state or about one job in 39. Approximately 42 percent of these positions are on-campus jobs and 58 percent are positions in the private or public sectors that exist because of the presence in the community of USG institutions.

Clayton State University has an economic impact on its region (the Southern Crescent) of 1,737 jobs. Initial spending in the Southern Crescent generated by the University for FY2007

The Clayton State University Department of Public Safety will begin routinely providing safety tips for inclusion in campus publications. The purpose is simply to ensure that our campus community is continuously reminded of both general and specific safety measures to practice. As most of you know, we have installed two tall siren alert towers in the vicinity of the Athletics & Fitness Center and the Maintenance building. Testing of the alerts will begin over the next few weeks. To familiarize all with the pre programmed messages in advance, the following are the four messages that could currently be broadcast in the event of an emergency:

CODE RED—THIS IS A CODE RED ALERT—THERE IS AN UNKNOWN INTRUDER ON CAMPUS. PLEASE GO TO THE NEAREST BUILDING AS QUICKLY AS POSSIBLE. ALL CAMPUS BUILDINGS ARE GOING INTO LOCK DOWN MODE IMMEDIATELY. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS. DO NOT GO TO ANY COMMON AREA OF A BUILDING. THIS IS A CODE RED ALERT.

ATTENTION—THIS IS A SEVERE WEATHER WARNING. A STRONG LINE OF SEVERE THUNDER-STORMS WITH HEAVY LIGHT-

NING IS APPROACHING THE CLAYTON STATE UNIVERSITY AREA. PREPARE TO TAKE SHELTER IMMEDIATELY.

ATTENTION—THERE IS A TORNADO WATCH FOR THE CLAYTON STATE UNIVERSITY AREA. THE CONDITIONS ARE RIGHT FOR A TORNADO TO FORM. PREPARE TO TAKE SHELTER. IF THE CONDITIONS CHANGE FROM A WATCH TO A WARNING, ANOTHER MESSAGE WILL BE BROADCAST.

CODE RED—A TORNADO HAS BEEN SPOTTED IN THE IMMEDIATE AREA. TAKE SHELTER IMMEDIATELY. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS.

We hope that the only times you hear the siren alerts are during tests, but we want everyone to be familiar with the messages and directions in advance in the event one of the above emergency situations occurs. Also, be aware of the locations of the emergency telephones that are spread throughout the campus for use if needed. department head of Dental Hygiene. "These students helped to create a liaison between Central Presbyterian and the Clayton State University Dental Hygiene Clinic and West End Medical Center, to provide care for these individuals at no cost."

## Clayton State Dental Hygiene Clinic Open this Summer

Clayton State University's Dental Hygiene Clinic is open again for business this summer. The clinic is open on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays each week during the summer semester.

The Clayton State University Dental Hygiene Program, part of the College of Professional Studies, operates the clinic in which Clayton State Dental Hygiene students treat patients under the supervision of dental hygiene faculty members. Every effort is made to accommodate patients, however, patients are appointed on the basis of the instructional needs of the student. All new patients require a minimum of two appointments. The clinic is located in the lower level of the Student Center Building in room D-103. Appointments to receive dental hygiene treatment may be made in person, by email: dhclinic@clayton.edu, or by calling (678) 466-4920. Clinic hours are subject to change without notice.

Treatments performed in the clinic may include; vital signs, oral examination, individualized home care instructions, dental charting, periodontal charting, prophylaxis (scaling and polishing), fluoride treatment, desensitizing treatment, radiographs (X-rays), sealants, nutritional counseling, and tobacco cessation counseling.

into a program down the road – we will just have to see.

Q. Will the same usage and dress guidelines for SmartBodies be in effect for the SAC fitness center?

A. In general, the dress code will be similar although tank tops will be allowed on the basketball courts. The primary reason for this is to insure a comfortable environment for everyone and to also minimize the amount of skin contact on the strength machine upholstery.

Q. Can I transfer my SmartBodies membership to the SAC fitness center?

A. All our current members are aware that their memberships will end July 31, 2008, including those enrolled in the payroll deduction program. All employees will have the option to sign up for payroll deduction for the new fitness center by July 18, 2008. New prices for the new fitness center go into effect in September, 2008.

Q. How much will fitness center memberships cost for employees?

A. The most cost-effective option is to join for one year for \$275 (or \$23 per month, via payroll deduction). A semester option is available for \$100 per semester and for those who insist on paying at the

counter, it will cost \$30 per month. Please call (678) 466-4971 for complete information.

Q. What type of membership categories are there for the fitness center?

A. Individual, companion (two people, same household), and family (three or more immediate family members in the same household). For pricing, please call (678) 466-4971 for complete information.

Q. Can Clayton State faculty and staff use the SAC even if they are not members of the fitness center?

A. Absolutely -- we hope to see you often! Certain fees may apply concerning facility reservations, (i.e., renting the ballroom).

was just under \$120 million and the output impact of the University was just under \$184 million.

"All 35 of the University system's institutions are economic engines in their communities and the state," said study author Dr. Jeffrey M. Humphreys, director of economic forecasting for the Selig Center. "The benefits they provide permeate both the private and public sectors of the communities that host the campuses. For each job created on a campus, there are 1.4 off-campus jobs that exist off-campus because of spending related to the college or university. These economic impacts demonstrate that continued emphasis on colleges and universities as a pillar of the

state's economy translates into jobs, higher incomes and greater production of goods and services for local households and businesses."

The seven institutions in the metro Atlanta area – Georgia Institute of Technology, Georgia State University, Clayton State University, Kennesaw State University, Southern Polytechnic State University, Atlanta Metropolitan College and Georgia Perimeter College – accounted for almost \$4.5 billion of the University System's \$11 billion total, and 40,700 jobs. ■
