Dr. Thomas J. "Tim" Hynes, Jr., will be inaugurated as Clayton State University's fourth president during the period, Sept. 30 to Oct. 2, 2010. The theme of the inauguration is, "A Commitment to Learning and Service."

Of course, the most important event will be the Investiture Ceremony at 10:30 a.m. on Friday, Oct. 1, in the University's Athletics & Fitness Center. The Investiture is schedule to run for an hourand-a-half, and will be followed by a picnic and ice cream social at 12:15 p.m. on the green by Swan Lake and the James M. Baker University Center.

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Prior to the investiture, on Thursday, Sept. 30, the Department of Visual and Performing Arts will hold a special showcase of their multi-faceted talents in Spivey Hall from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Following the

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Clayton State Ready for Constitution Week

Constitution Week 2010 is Monday, Sept. 13 to Friday, Sept. 17, and Clayton State University, in the persons of its Civic Engagement Council is ready for its annual observance.

Highlighting the week-long series of events will be the Wednesday, Sept. 15, keynote address by Eric Segall, professor of Law at Georgia State University, who will be speaking on "How the Supreme Court Decides Cases." Segall's address will be in room 272 of the James M. Baker University Center, and will run from 2 p.m. to 2:50 p.m.

As is always the case, Clayton State is making use of the resources of the nearby National Archives at Atlanta for Constitution Week. The National Archives will display documents related to the 14th Amendment from Tuesday, Sept. 14 through Friday, Sept. 17 on Main Street on the second floor of the Baker Center. Civic Engagement Council Chair Dr. Joseph Corrado notes that Clayton State professors are encouraged to take their classes to see this exhibit.

Also running throughout the week is another standard feature of Constitution Week at Clayton State, the voter registration drive. From Monday through Friday, voter registration and citizenship tests will be administered on Main Street in the Baker Center from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Monday, Sept. 13, will also have the First Amendment Lunch and Learn in Ballroom C of the Student Activities Center, starting at 11:30 a.m. Dr. Barbara Goodman, chair of the Clayton State Department of English, will be a part of the panel for this discussion on, "Leadership and the First Amendment," which will be led by Kevin Liles, editorin-chief of the University's student newspaper, The Bent Tree. The discussion will also feature invited media, industry, and academic professionals discussing the First Amendment and how it directly affects our lives.

Tuesday, Sept. 14 will have three Constitution Week events. The first is a Volunteer Fair in the Student Activities Center Ballroom from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Representatives from various local organizations and non-profit agencies will be on hand to provide information about what they do, and how students can help. Next is a constitutional debate, moderated by Associate Professor of Philosophy Dr.



Alexander Hall and Assistant Professor of Communication Dr. Keisha Tassie at the Amphitheatre by Swan Lake, from 11:15 a.m. to 12:35 p.m. Clayton State University Assistant Professor of Teacher Education Dr. Mary Hollowell and her sophomore multicultural education class will be hosting approximately 150 gifted students from Rex Mill Middle School for this event, which will feature three provocative debate issues:

Dean Eichelberger to be Recognized as Visionary Leader

Clayton State University's Dean of the College of Health, Dr. Lisa Eichelberger, will be recognized this fall as a visionary leader.

In conjunction with its 60th anniversary, the School of Nursing at University of Alabama at Birmingham will honor 60 visionary leaders, a grouping that includes alumnus Eichelberger.

Recently Eichelberger, who co-authored a textbook on Nursing Theory, published the second edition of her book entitled "Understanding the Work of Nurse Theorists: A Creative Beginning." The textbook uses art to teach nurses, the often



daunting task of learning nursing theories less intimidating and more innovative.

When Eichelberger begin her career at Clayton State in 1996,

Eichelberger has played a key role in the

Clayton State School of Nursing (SoN) helping to establish and develop both the bachelor and master degrees in nursing. Recently, Clayton State's SoN received its fourth Nursing Workforce Diversity grant. The SoN was awarded approximately \$1,089,000 over the next three years to continue their efforts to increase the diversity of the nursing workforce.

At the age of 35, Eichelberger became Dean of the School of Nursing at Mississippi College (MC), making her one of the youngest nursing deans in the country. She served as Dean at MC for eight years prior to coming to Clayton State in 1996.

international activities dealing with students, faculty members, and the larger

As a result, Parkerson is always on the look-out for mutually advantageous relationships between international universities, metro Atlanta's international business community, and Clayton State to support the University's global education initiatives.

"We can no longer survive and prosper as a nation on our resources alone," says Parkerson. "The OIP is about synergism where students, faculty, and communities effect growth of global relationships. "International education is so important for our students because the world is shrinking. Just read Thomas L. Friedman's The World is Flat; we are in an environment of advanced technology and global transportation. If our nation is going to continue to prosper in the future, we need to graduate a generation of professionals who understand other cultures and perspectives."

It is Parkerson's goal to help the Clayton State community develop this global perspective. After retiring as Delta Air Line's in-house international legal counsel, Parkerson, who is also a trustee of the Clayton State University Foundation, joined OIP in 2008. He put to work his 30 years of experience in international law, his relationships with Chambers of Commerce and the Georgia Department of Economic Development, and his role as Honorary Consul to the Republic of Hungary for the southeastern United States, to develop partnerships that have led to student and faculty exchange programs, as well as study abroad opportunities.

Under Parkerson's leadership, OIP has developed programs that range from a marine biology excursion in the Bahamas to a trip exploring Literary London. For the Clayton State School of Business, where Parkerson is also a Management professor, OIP also has created several international opportunities.

First on the list is India. We have a very mature relationship with part of the University of Mumbai system. We've had faculty exchanges for the last four years, Parkerson notes. OIP expanded that collaboration last year by working closely with the former Dean of the School of Business Dean, Dr. Jacob Chacko, to establish the first MBA trip to India.

Then OIP turned to Turkey. The May 2010 study abroad trip to Turkey actually got its start in 2008 with Parkerson's relationship with the Istanbul Center, which promotes education and cultural understanding between the United States and Turkey. This relationship initially led to

Clayton State Moves to Expand South African Connections

During the last week of August, 2010, Clayton State University hosted a visiting delegation from North-West University in South Africa (http://www.nwu.ac.za/nwu/index.html).

The delegation was led by led by Dr. M. Ngoato Takalo, vice principal and executive director: Teaching & Learning, North-West University. Accompanying Takalo were senior officials from each of North-West's three principal campuses, located in Potchefstroom, Mmbatho and Vanderbijlpark, South Africa.

Dr. Brian Haynes, Clayton State vice president for Student Affairs, had previously met Takalo some months ago at an academic conference. They subsequently maintained their contact, ultimately resulting in the visit to Clayton State. Representing Clayton State during the visit were; Haynes, Interim VP of Enrollment Management Dr. Mark Daddona, Professor Dr. Victoria Pasley, Professor Dr. LaJuan Simpson, Director of International Programs John Parkerson, and Assistant to the Director of International Programs Cele Blair. According to Parkerson, the delegation seemed particularly impressed by Clayton State's distance learning, instructional development and information technology programs. Among the topics generally discussed were:

- * undergraduate teaching (strategies, research undertaken, etc)
- * general student experience (both underand post- graduate)
- * faculty development
- * academic development and support
- * issues relating to student and faculty retention
- * academic planning including research related matters
- * how American universities deal with the scholarship of teaching/learning
- * research into student experience and student affairs in general

"These kinds of discussions are key contributors to our growing understanding at Clayton State of international educational practices," says Parkerson. "They also help our university to build strategic relationships with higher education institutions throughout the world and often lead, ultimately, to collaborative partnerships for faculty and student exchanges, study abroad opportunities, and research collaborations.

"South Africa constitutes one of the most rapidly growing economies in the developing world, together with a vibrant culture and an extremely important historical and political legacy. It is a critical element in Clayton State's international educational program, and Clayton State this year is organizing a three-week summer study abroad program to South Africa in which students may take courses in African history and politics."

Southard Named Recipient of Board of Regents Scholarship of Teach and Learning Award

Clayton State University Assistant Professor of Legal Studies/Paralegal Studies Sheryne Southard was recently selected as one of the 2011 fiscal year recipients of the University System of Georgia Board of Regents' SOT (Scholarship of Teaching and Learning) Award.

Southard is passionate about developing online courses that possess the same dynamic and engaging learning environment as traditional courses.

"It was a great honor to receive recognition from the Board of Regents for my work in this area," Southard says. "An award of this magnitude is not often a single-handed achievement. The Clayton State Center for Instructional Development helped bring many of my ideas to fruition. Also, I have collaborated on research projects with Dr. Mara Mooney, Dr. Michael Tidwell, Dr. Christie Burton and Dr. Rodger Bates. Their contributions have been instrumental to this work."

Southard's approach to SOT provided evidence on how she "closed the loop" to demonstrate its impact on student learning. "I view quality online instruction as a continual 'work in progress," Southard says. "It evolves as new information surfaces, innovative strategies develop, and improved resources emerge. The unifying thread of my ongoing research is measures to create an online learning environment conducive to maximum student performance. Specifically, the research is targeted at web-based pedagogy to improve the virtual learning experience. The evidence provided on how I 'close the loop' to demonstrate its impact on student learning within my classroom and the larger educational community included a winning entry in a national teaching competition, an invited talk at the Board of Regents, academic conference presentations, peer-reviewed and trade publications, contributions to online educational repositories, faculty mentoring, and service on national and university distance education committees."

Southard admits there were some challenges.

"The most challenging aspect of this research is the implementation phase of employing new instructional methods and processes," she explains. "At times this process is not seamless, as the theoretical does not always translate into reality. To counter this, I strive to be proactive by trying to anticipate potential issues and maintaining an even stronger online presence during this phase.

"The most rewarding aspect of my work is feedback that students found the online learning environment engaging and interesting, or that they learned a great deal in the course."

Southard has taught at Clayton State eight years, teaching Legal Issues for Administrators and Managers, Business Organizations, Computers and the Law, Legal Research and Writing, Contracts and Torts. Civil Litigation and Introduction to Law and Ethics. She earned her J.D. from the Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law at Arizona State University. In earning the SOT Award she had to submit a portfolio, which was then reviewed by a panel of faculty and administrators from across the University System.

The Dodd-Frank Act and the University Bookstore

On July 21, President Barack Obama signed into law the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act (the Dodd-Frank Act or the Act).

There are two ways this law directly impacts credit card fees. First, the law imposes new restrictions on the interchange fees that payment card networks may charge to merchants including universities — in debit card transactions. Second, payment card networks will no longer be able to impose certain restrictions on universities regarding establishing minimum or maximum transaction amounts as a condition for accepting debit or credit cards for payment, and regarding offering discounts for payment by cash rather than by credit card.

Last year the University Bookstore implemented a \$5 minimum credit card purchase program. During the fiscal year 2010(July 2009 - June 2010) the Bookstore paid more than \$17,000 in fees to the credit card companies.

During the fiscal year 2009, the Bookstore paid almost \$40,000 in the same fees. By simply asking customers to only use their credit cards if the purchase was over \$5, the fees paid to the credit card companies were almost halved.

The Bookstore is a self-sustaining operation and receives no State of Georgia funds or funds from tuition. All profits made by the Bookstore are used to control costs and/or returned to the students through investments in new Clayton State facilities and student programs. The Bookstore has thus funded:

- Academic scholarships
- LakerCard system upgrade
- Bookstore renovation
- Dining Hall renovation
- Jazzman's Café construction
- SAC Cafe construction
- Laker Hall Lounge construction

The Bookstore management is excited about the implementation of this new Act because it will provide the flexibility to try to control costs and provide excellent service to Clayton State University students, faculty and staff.

Todd Smith, Bookstore manager, suggests that the LakerCard be used for small purchases. Any LakerCard holder can stop by the LakerCard office and put \$5, \$10 or more on their LakerCard for these types of purchases. Laker Bucks can be charged to a credit card. There is no limit to the amount you can purchase in the Bookstore using the Laker Bucks because there are no fees to be paid to an external vendor.

The Bookstore management also wants the campus to know how important it is to hear your concerns, issues, suggestions, compliments about their operation. It is their mission to give the campus the best service at the best price.

four Turkish students joining Clayton State's MBA program. In turn, three of these students were able to accompany the study abroad group to Turkey, acting as both students and guides.

In addition to India and Turkey, OIP facilitated a agreement of collaboration in May 2009 with the University of Pannonia in Hungary. Parkerson himself went to Pannonia in February 2010 as Clayton State's first exchange faculty. He taught an English language international business class for two weeks. The two universities are currently selecting Pannonia and Clayton State business faculty representatives to exchange this fall.

"A Hungarian student has already joined Clayton State this fall, and we're reaching out to Clayton State students that would be interested in going there in exchange," says Parkerson. "Pannonia is about 60 miles from Budapest in the beautiful wine country. It's an exciting opportunity."

Jim Wood Speaker Series Goes International for 2010/2011 Kickoff

The Clayton State University School of Business' successful Jim Wood Speaker Series is going international for its first installment of the 2010/2011 Academic Year. Or, to put it another way, "If You are Hungary, You Can Eat International: a Diet to Satisfy the Global Business Palate."

John E. Parkerson, Jr., honorary consul of the Republic of Hungary for the southeastern United States, and director of the Office of International Programs (OIP) at Clayton State University, will kick off the 2010/2011 Jim Wood Speaker Series for the School of Business on Thursday, Sept. 16 from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in room B-14 of the Clayton State Lecture Hall. Parkerson's presentation is free and open to the public.

Parkerson will present to the audience how knowledge of the basics of "international" is essential today in an increasing flat and shrinking world.

If today's students are going to develop into successful business persons, and advance within their chosen fields, they must have at least a rudimentary knowledge of how the world – its economies, its resources, its people, its cultures interconnect, he notes. Being able to utilize, in developing business strategies and making decisions, potential synergies gains from understanding the basic components of our interdependent global business environment, give businesses (and individuals who lead them) significant competitive advantages. Those among us who have some idea about how international business operates – whether as academicians, professionals, or colleagues – must pass our knowledge and experience to others who do not yet have sufficient understanding of the importance of "international."

Parkerson will highlight his experience and lessons gained from 32 years of exclusive international legal, government, diplomatic, and academic practice, preceded by a solid educational foundation, and draw some conclusions about their importance to a successful international business practice. In addition to his diplomatic position with the Republic of Hungary and his direction of Clayton State's growing OIP, Parkerson is an established international attorney, an assistant professor of international business and global logistics in the School of Business, and a board member on numerous international-themed non-profit organizations.

The vaccinations will be given in UHS, room 211 of the Clayton State Student Center, during the following hours: Monday, 10 a.m. to 6:15 p.m.; Tuesday through Thursday, 10 a.m.

to 4:15 p.m.; and Friday, 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Types of payment accepted are cash, debit/credit cards and Laker Cards.

UHS typically serves only the Clayton State campus -- except during flu season when the flu vaccine is available. Costs for vaccinations are \$20 for the general public and \$15 for Clayton State students, faculty, and staff with a valid Laker Card. Please call University Health Services at (678) 466-4940 to make an appointment for a flu shot, although appointments are not necessary.

UHS will have the 2010 Flu Information Sheets and Consent Forms ar http://nursing.clayton.edu/uhs/default.htm, so that individuals wishing to get a flu shot can print them out and fill then out beforehand to reduce their waiting time.

University Health Services, under the direction of Spinolo, offers a wide array of services for the Clayton State community including assessments and treatment for acute primary care health care issues, immunizations, minor illness and injury management, laboratory tests, and health education. UHS also maintains all student health records. Dr. D. Ann Travis Honeycutt, family practice physician, is on site to provide professional medical assessments and services.

There is also a study abroad trip planned to Hungary wherein Clayton State will partner with Kennesaw State University's Coles College of Business.

"By partnering with Kennesaw for the Hungarian program, we ensure that we'll have the number of students we need to make the trip financially feasible," says Parkerson.

Opportunities for the School of Business are also in the planning stages at the University of Caen in France and the Georgia-American University in the Republic of Georgia, but Parkerson has even bigger plans for the future. "A number of larger universities have international centers that act as umbrella organizations within universities to support international studies. Georgia Tech, for example, has the European Union Center of Excellence," he says. "The OIP is now in the early stages of planning two such centers at Clayton State University. The first is the Center for Central-Eastern European Studies, which would house the Turkish and Hungarian activities. This program has been endorsed by the University, and we are currently seeking funding."

The second opportunity is a Gandhian Study Center. Grounded in the teachings

of Mahatma Gandhi, this center would have a political science, history, and philosophy focus.

"We are working with Indian universities to create the center. We would be able to exchange students and have seminars and lecture series that could take advantage of our growing relationship with the Indian community," says Parkerson, who finds that Clayton State's proximity to the Martin Luther King and Carter Centers makes the University a logical host for the Gandhian center.

Clayton State Prevails in Non-Division I Race at Georgia State Invitational

If Friday was any indication, Clayton State men's and women's head coach Mike Mead had to feel upbeat about the potential of both of his Laker squads following the Georgia State Invitational at Nash Farms to open the 2010 season.

Both Clayton State squads won the non-Division I races in the meet, and unofficially had tremendous finishes overall combined. The Laker men won the non-Division I race with 25 points, out-distancing Morehouse by five points, while Oglethorpe was third with 91 points and Reinhardt finished fourth with 106 points. In the women's non-Division I race, Clayton State prevailed with 17 points, easily ahead of Warren Wilson (44) and Spelman (67).

Overall combined with the Division I teams competing, the Clayton State men finished a close second to host Georgia State, coming up a point behind. In addition, the Lakers defeated Division I programs Troy, Jacksonville State and Mercer in the process. The Laker women unofficially placed fourth combined and defeated Mercer.

"The weather was hot – 100-plus degrees, and there was no shade on the course which had a lot of uphills and was a little longer than the advertised distances," says Mead. "Luckily the humidity was low, but many runners struggled with the extreme conditions."

Individually for the Clayton State, the Kenyan combination of Fidelis Mutiso and Albert Mong'ony excelled for the Lakers. Mutiso won the non-Division I 8K race in a time of 27:29.30, while Mong'ony placed a close second in

Three of Sayon's goals came in the first half. She scored in the 15th minute off an incoming pass from Natalia Valentine to give Clayton State a 1-0 lead. Eight minutes later, Sayon struck again, scoring again on a breakaway off a pass from the back from Erica Ortega. She gave the Lakers a 4-0 lead in the 32nd minute with 28:16.69. Overall, Mutiso and Mong'ony finished second and third overall, respectively, behind combined winner Enock Kirui from Troy.

In addition, freshman Charles Anderson had a strong debut in a Laker uniform, placing fifth (14th overall) in 29:45.01, while senior Jarrid Casimir finished eighth (18th overall) in 29:59.63 and sophomore Ricky Fort finished 11th (24th overall) in 31:13.30. Rounding out the Clayton State scoring was Cesar Valdovino (16th – 33:28.44), Ayrton Azcue (17th – 33:28.68) and freshman Russell Lawless (22nd – 36:30.85).

For the Clayton State women, freshman Samantha Walling had a tremendous Laker debut, finishing second in the non-Division I 5K race in 21:55.11, 40 seconds off the pace of champion Melissa Blummer from Reinhardt.

Overall, the Lakers had six runners finish in the Top 10 in the women's non-Division I race. In addition to Walling, sophomore Paige Galvin placed third in 23:17.01, followed by freshman Monique Bermudes in fourth in 23:44, junior Kourtney Aylor finished fifth in 23:44, senior Chelsea Ellis placed eighth in 25:22.17 and freshman FeLeshia Dyer finished 10th in 27:30.41.

Clayton State's next meet is the Bridgestone-Pacer Invitational at USC Aiken on Sept. 25. ■

Parson Weems

It just goes to show, you can't believe everything you read, especially if it's been written about an American idol.

Make no mistake, long before he was on the dollar bill and the quarter coin, George Washington was as famous as it was possible to be in a society without any form of rapid communication. By far the most renown and revered American both before and just after his death, Washington, not surprisingly, attracted the attention of more than one biographer in the early years of the 19th Century. Lakers Sweep Brevard in Straight Sets

The Clayton State Laker men's soccer continued to spread the wealth offensively on Saturday, using a stellar second half charge to pull off a convincing 6-1 victory over visiting Brevard at Laker Field.

Meanwhile, the women used the opposite route, riding a four-goal performance by Cherie Sayon to even their record at 1-1 with another tennis score, a 6-2 victory over visiting Brevard in the Lakers' home opener at Laker Field. The victory was the 100th in the Clayton State career for Coach T.O. Totty, now in his 13th season at the Laker helm. In addition, it was the most goals in a game for Clayton State since the 2006 season.

The men's victory kept the Lakers undefeated on the season at 4-0. It's the first time since the 2002 season that Clayton State has opened a season with four straight victories. Brevard falls to 0-4-1 overall.

To say the Lakers spread the wealth is an understatement – six different Clayton State players found the back of the net. Five of those goals came in the second half.

Junior Leighton Fredericks got the Lakers on the board in the first half with a penalty kick in the 38th minute, and the score stayed 1-0 in favor of Clayton State at halftime. However, the flood gates opened up in the second half for the Lakers.

Jonathan Ray got the onslaught going in the 54th minute with a goal in front of the

net off a cross by Kevin Rodriguez. And then in the 66th minute, junior Roger Boniface nailed his first goal of the season off a cross by Matty Phillips. But Clayton State was far from finished.

A pair of freshmen accounted for the next two Laker goals. Arturo Cruz scored off the dribble from the front of the penalty box in the 71st minute. Six minutes later, David Duot scored his first collegiate goal off an assist by Fredericks.

Phillips accounted for the final Laker goal in the 84th minute in front of the goal off a Brevard deflection. Brevard's lone goal came in the 88th minute off a 40-yard strike from the left wing by Anthony Cardenas.

Former Clayton State Player Kevin Young Hired as Head Coach of D-League's Utah Flash

The Utah Flash of the NBA's D-League officially introduced former Clayton State guard Kevin Young as its new head coach on Tuesday, Sept. 7. Young, who was the Lakers' point guard during the 2002-03 and 2003-04 seasons under head coach Gordon Gibbons, has been with the Flash since its inception in 2007.

A native of Marietta, Ga., Young has served in numerous capacities for the Flash, ranging from director of basketball operations, scout and assistant coach. This past season, he was an assistant for the Flash, which is the D-League affiliate of both the Atlanta Hawks and the Utah Jazz.

The Flash is coming off a 28-22 record in the 2009-10 season in which it advanced to the D-League Playoffs.

"We are all happy that Kevin has earned this tremendous opportunity," said Gibbons. "His relentless work ethic has put him in this position. He will do a tremendous job." Young was a two-year starter for Gibbons at Clayton State, helping pace the Lakers to marks of 17-12 in 2002-03 and 22-8 in 2003-04. He averaged six points and four assists during his junior season, followed by eight points and four assists during his senior season. Young is currently ranked eighth all-time at Clayton State in assists and 10th in steals.

Prior to playing at Clayton State, Young was a two-year starter at Middle Georgia College in Cochran, Ga.

Young has coached extensively at the international and collegiate levels before landing with the Flash. He served as general manager and head coach of the Shamrock Rovers Hoops in Dublin Ireland, plus one season each at Utah Valley State and Oxford College of Emory. Young guided the Hoops to the Nieva for Men Irish Super League Playoffs for the first time in four seasons.

"We are very excited to have Kevin take charge of this team and lead us through the 2010-11 season," said Flash Team President Drew Sellers. "Kevin has proven himself worthy to join the head coaching ranks."
