

Clayton State Cuts the Ribbon on Newly-Renovated Natural and Behavioral Sciences Building

Clayton State University had a ribboncutting on Sept. 26 for one of the oldest buildings on the 42-year old campus.

The Clayton State College of Arts & Sciences was celebrating the newly-renovated Natural and Behavioral Sciences (NBS) Building with a ceremony that included representatives of the architects (2WR) and contractor (Hogan Construction Group) for the renovation, the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia, and Clayton State President Dr. Thomas J. "Tim" Hynes.

One of the campus' original facilities, previously named the Business and Health Sciences (BHS) Building, the 42,000



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square-foot NBS has just undergone a \$600,000 extensive interior facelift, and has been given a new name in conjunction with its new tenants. As of the start of classes in August, BHS was renamed the

Natural and Behavioral Sciences Building; home to both the University's natural science programs (e.g., biology,

Rest assured, if DePoy is involved in the dialogue, it will be more than cool, it'll be entertaining and informative as well. Also, according to Flowers, the video Hynes version will be augmented by background scenes from the future, and some video clips of Clayton State students. ■

School of Business Renamed College of Business


Clayton State University's AACSBaccredited School of Business has been renamed the College of Business.

Following a July 2011 action by the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia, the School of Business became the College of Business, effective in January 2012. A ceremony that will include the unveiling of new signage for the College of Business will be held after the designation becomes official in January.

In preparation for becoming the College of Business, Dean Dr. Alphonso Ogbuehi recently appointed three professors as department chairs. All three report directly to the dean. Associate Professor of Accounting Gregory Kordecki was named department chair for the accounting, finance, legal and economic professors. His department will be known as LEAF (Law, Economic, Accounting, and Finance).

Professor of Management Dr. Louis Jordan was named department chair for the marketing, management and supply chain management professors. His organization is MMS (for Management, Marketing and Supply Chain).

Professor of Health Care Management Dr. Peter Fitzpatrick is now department head for Health Care Management. ■

Dean Ogbuehi Authors Op-Ed Piece for Atlanta Business Chronicle

Dr. Alphonso Ogbuehi, dean of the College of Business at Clayton State University, has been rethinking where business education should be going in the future.

Ogbuehi shared his thoughts in the current issue of the Atlanta Business Chronicle (ABC), authoring an op-ed article entitled "Rethinking biz ed in post-recession world." Ogbuehi's article, which appears in the ABC issue now on newsstands and the web, argues that the time has come for business education to get away from its traditional linear curriculum that empha-



sizes a narrow field of business competencies, and, in effect, think outside the box, moving towards a nonlinear approach to education that focuses more on experiential learning, liberal arts, global perspectives

and social consciousness.

The thrust of Ogbuehi's thinking is that business education needs to change its approach in two major areas; creating a new teaching formula that places a greater emphasis on student engagement through experiential learning, and further integrating liberal arts studies into the traditional business curricula.

"The leadership and faculty in the College of Business at Clayton State University have made a commitment to actively engage members of the wider business community to assist us in achieving such learning experiences," he writes. ■

Clayton State's doubles tandem of Marie Cercelletti and Ivana Krommelova made a strong push in the women's doubles "A" Division this past weekend at the ITA Division II Southeast Regionals at the Palmetto Tennis Center. The Laker duo advanced to the "A" Division semifinals for the Lakers, providing the big highlight for Clayton State's weekend. Cercelletti and Krommelova were the only Clayton State players – singles and doubles – to advance past the Round of the 16 in the Regional.

Running in one of the biggest regular season meets of the season, the Clayton State Laker men's cross country team placed fourth on Saturday in the Greater Louisville Cross Country Classic at E.P. Tom Sawyer State Park. Individually for the Lakers, senior Albert Mong'ony placed fifth overall in the 8K event, breaking 26 minutes for the first time at that distance with a time of 25:38.73. Sophomore Charles Anderson finished 26th overall with a time of 26:47.74, just 10 seconds off his personal best, while freshman Alex Foss placed 28th with a time of 26:51.25. The women's team placed sixth in the same meet. Individually for the Lakers, the top five runners finished less than a minute apart from each other. Freshman Jessica Smith had the top Clayton State finish in 25th with a time of 20:00.48 in the 5K event, followed sophomore Samantha Walling in 31st in 20:07.38 and sophomore Paige Galvin in 35th in 20:14.94.

Reviving Story Telling in The Face of Technology

"Moonshine and Magnolias" - Jonesboro's Historic Narrative, Presented by Kalani Fraser And the Clayton State Theatre

Clayton State University theatre graduate Kalani Fraser, under commission from Stately Oaks Plantation, has written and is producing a remarkable portrayal of the city of Jonesboro to be performed by the students of the Clayton State Theater, under the direction of Phillip Depoy. Scheduled to show dates are Nov. 10 through Nov. 13 at 7 p.m. in the Clayton State Theatre, room 132 of the University's Arts & Sciences Building.

"Moonshine and Magnolias" will take you back as far as the year 1845, telling more than 20 different stories of 90 different characters. The cast of Clayton State Theater students will take on multiple parts, as many as seven each. This city of Jonesboro's wide spanning, rich history will be showcased, including "The Battle of Jonesboro," which took place from Aug. 31, 1864 to Sept. 1, 1864. Events that shaped this community will be relived right before the audience's eyes!

It's also a story that comes into the present-day. Fraser has declared that, as we move deeper into the technological age, there is emerging a great disconnect between the generations, both for the people and the community. She tells of the importance of story telling.

"Story telling is one of our greatest tools, it forces us to make a personal connection and the more we listen the more we will hear our own stories," she says. "Come out learn of Jonesboro's history and reconnect with your community!"

This production of "Moonshine and Magnolias" is a "workshop run." Clayton State University's Theater Department is showing Stately Oaks and Historical Jonesboro what the productions should look like. Beginning in the summer of 2012, the city of Jonesboro will tour a production of "Moonshine and Magnolias" modeled after the expertise of Clayton State's theatre department. ■

"People love the new look and really like the new name. We sell so much more than books. People recognize us for that and I think they love us as a shop for all their needs. This is a place where they want to come instead of a place they have to come once a semester."

Students in good standing at all ranks are encouraged to apply to the popular University System of Georgia European Council London Study Abroad Program. The four-week program, based at University College London, is scheduled for June 24-July 23, 2012.

University College London is located in central London, with residence halls and classroom facilities conveniently located near major recreation, shopping, dining, and entertainments venues. Participants will earn up to six credit hours toward graduation through scheduled classes and educational field trips.

chemistry) and the psychology program. NBS also houses Clayton State's new First-Year Advising & Retention Center.



Clayton State University Dental Hygiene seniors Temenuga Angelova (Norcross), Mariya Iskhakova (Atlanta), Wendy Orellana (Stone Mountain), Elise Robinson (Senoia), and faculty member Joanna Harris, were among the volunteers for Georgia's Mission of Mercy (GMOM), sponsored by Georgia Dental Association (GDA) last month at The First Baptist Church of Woodstock.

Georgia's Mission of Mercy exceeded all expectations by providing free dental care to an remarkable 2,179 Georgians suffering from oral disease and pain. The 900 dental volunteers, including 300 dentists, provided cleanings, fillings, extractions, limited root canal therapy, and lab procedures valued at \$1.5 million. On Sept. 22, he was speaking to Merck in Cork, Ireland, on "Regulatory Inspections and Compliance in Process Manufacturing" to an audience that included 50 to 60 representatives of European pharmaceutical companies.

Finally, come December, he's on a Pfizer program on FDA Good Manufacturing Practices at that company's Pennsylvania facility in Collegeville, Pa. ■

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Campbell Hired as New Men's Assistant Basketball Coach

With the beginning of preseason practice a little more than a month away, Clayton State Laker men's head basketball coach Gordon Gibbons wasted little time in filling in coaching staff for the upcoming season.

Gibbons has announced the hiring of Tony Campbell as the Lakers' new assistant coach. Campbell comes to Clayton State following a three-year stint as a men's assistant coach at NAIA program Reinhardt in Waleska, Ga. He replaces Andy Harre, who left the Laker program last month to become the top men's assistant at Division I Grambling State.

"Tony is a tremendous addition to our staff and our program," says Gibbons, who is 190-109 entering his 11th season at Clayton State. "He brings experience and a highlyenergetic work ethic to our program."

Campbell, a native of Marietta, Ga., served under head coach Jeffrey Pourchier at Reinhardt. He helped pace the Eagles to a 16-15 mark last season, advancing to the Appalachian Athletic Conference Championship game. In the 2009-10 season, Campbell was a part of an Eagle team that finished 17-12.

Prior to coming to Reinhardt, Campbell served one season at Truett-McConnell under former Clayton State player and assistant coach Cory Baldwin. In that one season, he helped pace the Bears to an impressive 21-11 mark in the 2007-08 season.

As a player, Campbell played three seasons at Georgia Southwestern as the Hurricanes made the transition from NAIA to NCAA Division II status and the Peach Belt Conference. He helped pace Georgia Southwestern to the 2005 NAIA Division I National Tournament, and was also on the Hurricane team that made its NCAA Division II and Peach Belt Conference debut in the 2006-07 season.

Campbell played his first season collegiately at Kennesaw State, and was a prep standout under head coach Roger Kvam at Sprayberry High School. He earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Psychology from Georgia Southwestern.

Milestone Victory for Clayton State Men in 4-0 Shutout Over North Georgia

On a night when an historic victory was recorded, the Clayton State Laker men's soccer team took care of business early and propelled itself back in the race for the Peach Belt Conference championship.

Spearheaded by three first-half goals, Clayton State recorded its second straight shutout with a 4-0 victory in Peach Belt action over visiting North Georgia at Laker Field last Tuesday. Clayton State, ranked 13th in the nation in Division II, improves to 7-2 overall and 2-1 in the Peach Belt. Meanwhile, North Georgia is now 4-4-1 overall and 2-2 in the Peach Belt.

The victory was a milestone for the Lakers in that it was the 200th victory in the history of men's soccer at Clayton State, which is now in its 20th season. Clayton State is now 16-0-1 lifetime against North Georgia.

The Lakers wasted little time taking control. Just two minutes into the contest, junior for-

ward Kenny Mena fed senior forward Matty Phillips down the middle and Phillips hammered home his third goal of the season from the top of the penalty box.

Clayton State scored its next two goals within a minute apart. Jonathan Ray scored his third goal of the season in the 25th minute on a header off an assist by Phillips, followed by a penalty kick goal by Janny Rivera a minute later.

The Lakers finished off their scoring in the 48th minute when Ryan Pugh found Mena with a right cross at the top of the penalty box. Mena slammed home his sixth goal of the season.

Clayton State out-shot North Georgia 15-9, holding the Saints without a shot in the first half. The goalkeeper combination of Brian Garcia and Jon Skinner recorded the shutout with four saves. North Georgia goalkeeper Rade Tanaskovic recorded five saves.

Blessed Saint Leibowitz, Keep 'Em Dreamin' Down There by John Shiffert, University Relations

Certainly an odd phrase, these were the last words of American astronaut Randy Claggett, one of the main character's in James Michener's novel "Space," spoken just before Claggett's fictional Apollo 18 lander (recall that there actually was no Apollo 18 mission) crashed on to the far side of the moon.

Michener's fictional character was himself referring to another fictional character, from the post-apocalyptic nuclear war cult novel, "A Canticle for Leibowitz" by Walter Miller. The only published work during Miller's lifetime, it tells the story of an order of monks in the southwestern U.S. who are bent on preserving the surviving remnants of man's scientific knowledge until the day the world is ready for same. Quite a story, and apparently one that only former Clayton State professor B.D. Stillion has read. She had the first and only correct answer to Claggett's last words and the obscure reference that Michener (clearly a Miller fan himself) intended. For that insight into one of this year's more difficult trivia questions, Dr. Stillion garners a total of, what else, 18 Trivia Points (two first places, and a six point bonus for having the only correct answers.)

Since we're already on the moon, what is the oldest object ever found there (at least according to Arthur C. Clarke)? And, no, it's not an old copy of Pink Floyd's "Dark Side of the Moon" (already used as a trivia question anyway.)

<u>Sports</u> Former Clayton State Standout Tillman Signs Professional Contract with Top Spanish Club

She had arguably the best two-year career for a Clayton State women's basketball player, and helped lead the Lakers to the ultimate prize. Now, Teshymia Tillman is set for another adventure in her basketball career.

Tillman recently signed a two-year contract with the Ros Casares professional club in Valencia, Spain, and she has already embarked on her professional playing career. Ros Casares is in the Liga Femenina de Baloncesto, which is the top women's professional league in Spain. There are 14 teams in the league, and Ros Casares has won seven league titles, including four of the last five.

Tillman is the third Clayton State player under head coach Dennis Cox to sign a professional contract to play overseas. Jamika Hindsman played in Romania in the 2006/07 season, while Shantel Ragin played last season in the Ukraine.

"We are so excited for Teshymia," says Cox. "She has worked hard for this opportunity, and we are all proud that one of our own will have the opportunity to play in such a prestigious league in Europe. I know this will be the beginning of a life-long dream for her, and I am confident that she will go over there and represent us well."


Tillman, a 5-foot-9 wing from High

Point, N.C., enjoyed a stellar career at Clayton State, leading the Lakers to the 2011 NCAA Division II National Championship with a 35-1 record.

She was a two-time first team All-Peach Belt Conference and NCAA Division II All-Southeast Region selection. In addition, Tillman became just the second Laker in Clayton State women's basketball history to garner Division II All-American honors as she was a WBCA Division II honorable mention selection this past season.

Tillman was the Lakers' leading scorer this past season, averaging 15 points and five



Her best performance was a season-high 27 points on 11-for-14 shooting from the field against Francis Marion. Tillman also scored 26 points in the NCAA Division II National Championship game against Michigan Tech, and 24 points in the Lakers' thrilling two-point victory over then-No. 1-ranked Lander.

For her career, Tillman finished with 1,062 points in just two seasons, ranking her fourth all-time at Clayton State. She also holds the Clayton State career record for scoring average (16.1 ppg), the Laker single-season marks for points (547 - 2011), field goals (226 - 2011) and field goal attempts (437 - 2011) and the Clayton State single-game record game record for field goals with 14.

Clayton State Women End Losing Skid with 1-0 Win Over Georgia College

Aiming to snap a recent losing skid, the Clayton State Laker women's soccer team got an early first-half goal and literally held on for dear life to edge visiting Georgia College 1-0 in Peach Belt Conference action at Laker Field on Saturday.

The victory ends a three-game losing streak for Clayton State, which improves to 4-5 overall and 1-3 in the Peach Belt. It also snapped a five-game losing streak head-to-head for the Lakers against Georgia College. The Bobcats fall to 3-7 overall and 2-2 in the Peach Belt.

"We're delighted with our first conference victory," says Clayton State head coach Gareth O'Sullivan. "We were fortunate to be leading at halftime, but the girls played a strong second half and did what we needed to do to maintain the victory."

In a defensive battle, Clayton State got its only goal in a peculiar way. Lorna O'Connell entered the ball on a throw-in, which was deflected back to her by a Georgia College defender. The junior then lofted the ball from 25 yards out into the penalty box, where it took a funny bounce over Georgia College goalkeeper Taylor Cornelius and into the goal in the 11th minute.

That turned out to be the lone goal of the contest, but it was not without its share of dramatics. Clayton State goalkeeper Laoise O'Driscoll recorded nine saves, but her biggest came in the 73rd minute when Georgia College had a chance to tie on a penalty kick. However, O'Driscoll

thwarted the chance by the Bobcats' Brittany Borror.

For the game, Georgia College out-shot the Lakers 19-9, and the two teams combined for 23 fouls. ■

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
