Discussion of Results and Changes

The political science program underwent two department chair changes between 2006 and 2008. During this period of time, the department was in the process of trying to finalize their program outcomes and assessment plan. The program approved the outcomes in Fall 2008 and the current plan was enacted. To date, the following results and changes have occurred.

During the last two semesters, a Pre/Post survey of American and Georgia Politics was administered in POLS 1101. The results (see Table below) showed only marginal improvement from pre to post administration in overall terms; however, students still seemed to be having difficulty grasping certain essential factual and conceptual information pertaining to American government. As a result, in Summer 2009 we decided to adopt a new required text and redesign the course so students would have a better foundation of the prerequisite knowledge needed for subsequent courses. We will need to continue to track the survey results during the upcoming semesters to see if a further courses changes or revisions are required.
